

All true (well, almost all), and all there for the tourist. But what about permanent residents? Polancy's guide is essential for anyone seriously contemplating relocation. A Kauai entrepreneur learned only after the fact that her home-operated business would be severely hampered by the limit of only one telephone line in her condo and the absence of home postal delivery, with a year-long wait for a P.O. box. While a military assignment can be considered a transfer to paradise, the financial realities, including higher rent, insurance, utilities, and food, may cause a plunge into personal bankruptcy. Polancy provides useful information on the pluses and minuses of each island, facilities for children, and such delights as tsunamis and hurricanes, rats, head lice, roaches, crime, and DUI penalties. As a "military brat" who lived in Hawaii when my father was stationed at Hickam AFB in the early 70s and a former airline employee who has visited Hawaii at every opportunity, I have recently acquired and read several books on this subject. (I've got the bug!) This is BY FAR the best of the bunch. It gives much of the same statistical information as the others but goes beyond the raw numbers with analysis and interviews with a variety of people who have actually DONE IT. Note to military: Excellent section on "Assignment Paradise."

There doesn't seem to be all that much published in hard copy on this subject so it was good to find this guide. It contains some very good information. However I already knew about a lot of what is in the guide from hunting around on the Internet and if you are reading this review chances are that you too can find most of what is in this guide out there on the rest of the Internet too. I think the book does not provide quite enough information or enough depth of information to rate say, four or five stars. Still, for the money it is not a bad addition to your Hawaii research bookshelf.

If you're looking to move to Hawaii this covers the questions you'll want answered. It's a little out of date now or I'd give it 5 stars. For the most part it gives a heads up on what you can expect. Hopefully. We'll know more when we actually visit. :)
